Leadership Institute NCCAT works with Burke County

A team of Burke County educators worked on creating more teacher leaders during a specialized program from the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching, a nationally recognized leader in professional development.

For four days in Cullowhee, the 21 educators took part in a variety of efforts to help teacher leadership flourish in the district. The Teacher Leadership Institute program is a new offering designed to respond to the needs of school districts.

"This has been great," Burke County Superintendent Dr. Larry Putnam said. "Now that we've participated in this program, we are already talking about building a support group that doesn't stop here. This experience has offered a professional and safe environment. People have opened up and shared thoughts about efforts we can take to create things that are beneficial to students."

Two distinguished educators lead the NCCAT program. Dr. Bruce Boyles is a former superintendent of Cleveland County Schools and is now an associate professor at Gardner-Webb University. Dr. Ed Davis worked for 35 years in the Union County Public Schools including time as an assistant superintendent and superintendent. He now works as an assistant professor at Wingate University.

The essential components of the program cover the topic of leadership as a concept and the specifics of teacher leadership. Educators explore the elements of leadership, teacher leadership potential, personality traits, group dynamics, mentoring, problem solving, teacher leadership standards, and implementing teacher leadership roles in the school setting. Other elements of the program can be selected at the discretion of the Local Education Agencies (LEA) and include such topics as Professional Learning Communities, Data Informed Leadership, Team Building, Technology Leadership, and School Improvement Plans.

Boyles and Davis spoke with Burke County educators before the program and customized content to the needs of the district. Burke County educators were engaged and had the chance to make connections across the school district that will help in the future to build a culture of leadership at all levels.

We will continue to focus on bringing teachers together from across the state to enhance their ability to serve North Carolina students.

We want to thank the NCCAT Board of Trustees and Board of Directors of the Development Foundation of NCCAT for their support and commitment. We look forward to a bright future for NCCAT and the teachers we serve.

NCCAT Executive Director Dr. M. Brock Womble met with Mrs. Jean Powell and her family members on September 28 in Wilmington, North Carolina. Dr. Womble spoke about the past, present, and future of

NCCAT for North Carolina teachers.

In 1983, while serving as North Carolina Teacher of the Year, Mrs. Powell, of Clinton, was invited to address the Commission on Education and Economic Growth about physical improvements needed in schools. It was during this speech that Mrs. Powell suggested the idea for NCCAT, which was later established by the North Carolina legislature.

In his remarks Dr. Womble informed the audience of NCCAT's history, current status, and future as a recognized national leader in professional development.

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Wake County teacher at NCCAT **Hands-on learning experience**

Knightdale kindergarten teacher April Zolnierowicz came away from "Mission Possible: Covering Social Studies and Science Content Using Literacy" with more than she had imagined to take back to her classroom in Wake County.

"I could use each thing that I learned in my kindergarten classroom,"

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Zolnierowicz said. "Amy Jo Spencer (NCCAT faculty member) was an excellent teacher because she made learning fun and used the eight multiple intelligences to teach us like we are taught to teach our students. I also like the fact that everything she showed us was free and easy to use."

During the four-day program at Ocracoke educators were able to examine the North Carolina Essential Standards and make connections to the North Carolina Standard Course of Study, ELA and Writing Standards. They investigated text sets and the role they play in integrating multiple contents. Teachers were able to create engaging cross-curricular instructional units with culminating projects for assessments.

Zolnierowicz is looking forward to taking part in another NCCAT program. "It is such a great way for teachers to share ideas and remember the real reasons they became teachers," said Zolnierowicz.

Canvas training opportunities at NCCAT

Canvas, North Carolina's Learning Management System (LMS), is a one-stop learning and course management tool. A learning management system is a software application for the administration, documentation, tracking, reporting and delivery of electronic educational technology (also called e-learning) courses or training programs.

"Canvas is a fabulous tool for educators," Davidson County Instructional Technology Facilitator Leigh Hopkins said. "There are many layers, and it is not something you can learn in a day. I feel like our first adopters benefited by coming to NCCAT and being able to learn from Elizabeth Joyce (NCCAT faculty member)."

Hopkins said the beauty of Canvas is you can make it what you want or need it to be.

"With technology, you have all these digital tools, and now you can put it all together," Hopkins said. "It centralizes everything. It can improve communication between teacher and student. It extends teacher effectiveness."
